Rules

A donation to the Club is requested from all participants in lieu of a set fee per entry.

- 1 All open classes.
- 2 £1 will be awarded to the winner of each class, except where otherwise stated.
- 3 The Perpetual Shield or Cup will be awarded to the overall winner of divisions A, B, C, D and E.
- 4 All horticultural exhibits must have been grown by their exhibitors, except in division C.
- 5 For division E all entries must be produced by the exhibitor and not have been previously entered at this show.
- 6 One entry only per exhibitor per class.
- 7 All entry forms to be with the Show Secretary by 11.30 am on show day.
- 8 All entries to be staged by 11.45 am on show day.
- 9 Judging to commence at noon.
- 10 Only the Show Secretary or stewards may move an exhibit after staging.
- 11 The judges' decision is final.
- 12 Vases and society boxes will be provided.
- 13 All exhibits not for auction must be removed by 4pm.

Division A

Vegetables and Fruit

- A1 Four onions (dressed)
- A2 Nine shallots
- A3 Four carrots with three inches of foliage
- A4 Four beetroots with four inches of foliage
- A5 Four courgettes, five to eight inches long
- A6 Two parsnips with three inches of foliage
- A7 Four tomatoes with calyces
- A8 Nine cherry tomatoes with calyces
- A9 One truss of tomatoes
- A10 Four potatoes (any single colour)
- A11 Six French beans (dwarf or climbing), with stalks
- A12 Six runner beans, with stalks
- A13 The longest runner bean, with stalk
- A14 Four varieties of herbs (named and not in flower)
- A15 A plate of three different soft fruits, three specimens of each (nine total)
- A16 A plate of six dessert apples
- A17 A plate of six plumbs
- A18 A vegetable tray of six different vegetables
One of each, cleaned and dressed if appropriate, to fit within maximum size 14 by 10 inches, for example a seed tray

NB: Tomatoes can be any uniform colour

Division B

Flowers

- B1 Vase of three different annuals (one stem of each)
- B2 Vase of three different perennials (one stem of each)
- B3 Vase of three antirrhinums (Snap dragons)
- B4 One specimen bloom rose
- B5 Vase of three stems of Hybrid Tea rose (one variety)
- B11 Six different fuchsia blooms in a society box (supplied by Show)
- B15 A growing planted arrangement in an unusual container (15 inch max width)
- B13 One potted fuchsia (nine-inch pot max)
- B16 One potted house plant (nine-inch pot max)
- B17 Any potted plant (other than the above nine-inch pot max)
- B18 Vase of three dahlias, bloom under five inches
- B19 Vase of three dahlias, bloom over five inches

Plants in this division may have been bought but must have been in the care of the exhibitor for a least three months prior to showing and not shown previously.

Children's Corner

Up to 11 years

Floral item made or grown by a child

Exhibits by children are also welcome in any of the main divisions.

Division C - Floral Art

We no longer require that all exhibits must be arranged in the show hall. They can be brought to the show pre-arranged.

No arrangement shall exceed a width and depth of 18 inches.

- C1 A selection of coloured glass jars containing flowers
- C2 A flower arrangement in a kitchen utensil
- C3 Any arrangement made with no oasis

Division D - Domestic

- D1 Six shortbread biscuits
- D2 Six cheese scones
- D4 Six sausage rolls
- D7 A chocolate cake
- D8 A lemon drizzle cake
- D9 Four decorated cup cakes
- D10 Sponge cake with jam and cream
- D11 A vegetarian dish
- D12 A jarred preserve (any food prepared to stop or slow down spoilage)

Division E - Handicraft

- E1 A picture in any medium
- E2 A knitted item
- E3 A small quilted item

Division F - Photography

Entries from amateur photographers only, which must be entirely your own work. No copying of others work will be acceptable, altered or not.

- F1 Wildlife in your garden (unframed, max six by eight inches)
- F2 Summer colour (unframed, max six by eight inches)
